December's Builder Theme: Kigatsuku: Being Helpful and Serving

Our builder's theme for the month of December is "I can be a builder by being helpful and serving others." At this week's assembly we discussed serving others as a way to give thanks. Parent Student Handbook - Holiday Celebrations:

We do not celebrate holidays, although we do acknowledge some of them (see below). We don't have class holiday parties, but instead we have fun culminating activities that go along with our units of study in history and science. Students often dress up, have food, and play games at these activities.

Birthday Celebrations: Teachers will most likely mention a student's birthday during the school day of their birthday and have a special way of acknowledging that student. Parents may bring a treat for class members at lunch time. This is not something that needs to be done, but if parents choose

Hand, Foot and Mouth Disease

We have a student with diagnosed hand, foot and mouth disease.

HFMD is not usually serious and children usually recover without medical treatment in 7 to 10 days. Complications are uncommon. Very rarely, children may develop viral meningitis or encephalitis and would need medical care. Symptoms of these more serious complications are fever, headache, stiff neck or backpain. Again, these are very rare occurrences.

The reason we notify parents when we have had a case of HFMD is that if a pregnant mother is infected with HFMD near the time of delivery, she may pass the virus to her newborn baby. Even were this to occur, it is usually not a problem, but in very rare cases the baby may develop life-threatening infection.

Hand, foot, and mouth disease (HFMD) is a common illness of infants and children. It is characterized by fever, sores in the mouth, and a rash with blisters. HFMD begins with a mild fever, poor appetite, malaise ("feeling sick"), and frequently a sore throat. One or 2 days after the fever begins, painful sores develop in the mouth. They begin as small red spots that blister and then often become ulcers. They are usually located on the tongue, gums, and inside of the cheeks. The skin rash develops over 1 to 2 days with flat or raised red spots, some with blisters. The rash does not itch, and it is usually located on the palms of the hands and soles of the feet. It may also appear on the buttocks. A person with HFMD may have only the rash or the mouth ulcers.
